Feedback Obtained
Feedback at every level is an integral part of the quality check mechanism, both for faculty as well as students. Feedback Monitoring Cell encourages all the stakeholders to give feedback as an assessment of their perception is necessary for imaginative planning and effective performance of the institution. To determine the effectiveness of its systems, the University's feedback mechanism operates on the following levels : Students are the primary stakeholders who contribute significantly towards the overall development of

the University. • The Tutor Guardian system facilitates the collection of feedback from the students maintaining a healthy interaction between staff and students. • The Student Welfare Cell contributes towards quality enhancement through the suggestions of the students for improvement in various activities and also for taking up new activities. • The feedback received from the Alumnae on the University website also ensures quality assurance within the academic system. • The Student Council further creates an effective channel for feedback through interaction with the students. • Regular and objective feedback on the functioning of the college in terms of teaching, learning and evaluation is sought through a feedback form. All the faculty members of the University as a stakeholder contribute towards upgrading the teaching learning atmosphere. • A feedback system to evaluate the performance of the respective faculty member by the Head of the Department and the Deans has been devised by the University. • Self-appraisal of teachers, done annually also helps one introspect the strengths and weaknesses thereby ensuring quality in instruction and learning. Parents are the vital stakeholders of the University and their contribution in the overall development of its students is sought. • Their feedback regarding special needs of their wards vis-a-vis the facilities available in the university during the Orientation programme at the beginning of the session. • Their involvement in annual functions, fashion shows, exhibitions, and other events, where they can give feedback on various academic and cultural issues

Industry Representatives: In order to elicit their contribution and feedback the University ensures their active involvement. • as members of Board of management, BOS, Planning Monitoring Board and other statutory bodies and committees. • as Subject Experts and members of board of examiners in planning and implementation of various policies promoting better learning experience by the students. An external academic review is ensured through feedback forms that are filled by external examiners and experts at the time of evaluation of projects, seminars, answer books and at the time of moderation of question papers. Grievance Appeal Committee has been constituted for the redressal of the problems reported by students, staff and parents. It addresses grievances regarding academic matters, library, transportation, health services and other central services etc. Grievance Redressal Committee is formulated to address all examination related grievances of the students. The Committee deliberates upon the grievances communicated and immediate action/decision is taken.

The university organized several activities for the purpose of Environmental awareness and protection in the session. The following activities were organized by the department of Environmental science:

- 1) Guest lectures on various topics related to Environmental issues were organized by the Department of Environmental Science including lectures on Global Environmental issues, Biodiversity conservation, and application of Environmental Sciences in environmental conservation. The lectures were delivered by prominent scientists in the field of Environmental Science.
- 2) Poster making competition was organized to mark the world Ozone day on 16th September which emphasized on the causes and control of ozone depletion.
- 3) Workshop on waste paper recycling and handmade paper making was organized in collaboration with Kummerappa National Institute of handmade Paper, Jaipur. The workshop gave an insight to the students about saving paper and utilizing waste paper.
- 4) Tree Plantation campaign is also organized by NSS committee of University in the month of July every year to create awareness among the people about importance of conservation of plants.
- 5) Nukkadnataks are organized with aim to make public aware of issues related to water crisis and methods of water conservation. In addition to all the above mentioned efforts of environmental awareness, research on environmental problems and coming up with its remediation technologies is a continuous practice of the department of Environmental Science.

It has a goal to generate social consciousness among the youth to meet the challenges of the society and the world at large with quality education. To meet these goals a systemic feedback system has been developed. In this system, many activities are conducted like regular feedback from various stakeholders, analysis of feedback and preparation of reports planning and action based on the feedback reports and placing it before the management for further action. It also monitors the performance of departments by conducting academic audit and suggest remedial action for quality maintenance. To strengthen the feedback mechanics of the University, IQAC collected feedback from the Grievance Appeal Redressal Committee, Mentor Guardian, Students, Stakeholders along with the feedback from Senior Faculty members, Non-Teaching Staff, Alumnae and Examiners through the Examination cell etc. on regular basis. There is a well-defined timeline to collect and analyse feedback from different stakeholders. Feedback process adopted by university is systematic, rigorous and respectful of the rights of both students and staff. Feedback from students is obtained broadly related to the issues like faculties, curriculum, teaching-learning evaluation and support services etc. The feedback is compiled and analysed by the IQAC cell of the University. The outcome is made available to the authorities, faculty members and BOS members for their perusal and further actions. The feedback from the students provides an opportunity for introspection and improvement of the faculty members. Regular feedback of the faculties with

regard to curriculum and its relevance in the modern market scenario is also taken. On the basis of the feedback, new dimensions to the traditional teaching pedagogy have been implemented. Feedback from parent are also collected. These feedbacks are used to:

- Improve the quality of courses and programs.
- Organize professional development programs for the faculty and students.
- Enhance course and curriculum design as per the need spelled by the faculty, expertise available and need assessment from the stake holders.
- Improve the provision of learning resources, facilities, equipment and services.
- Procure additional resources and adopt new ICT based and skill oriented teaching, learning techniques.
- Review scheme of examination and pattern of question papers for each program and changes are done after discussing it in the meeting of B.O.S.
- Thus this feedback mechanics helps to identify weakness and plan actions to overcome them.
